### Proposed Club Bylaw Change

The Executive Board has recommended a change to the Club Bylaws. (These bylaws are available at the club's web site: [www.sjpc.org/sjrc/](http://www.sjpc.org/sjrc/) )

The current version of the section to be changed is below:

"Article 6, Section II, B: Voting shall be by secret ballot. Ballots will contain nominees and provision for write-ins. Ballots will be mailed a minimum of 30 days before the October general meeting. They must be received back for counting no less than 5 days before the meeting. The candidate receiving the most votes for each office is elected to that office."

The proposed version is:

"Article 6, Section II, B: Voting shall be performed at the annual meeting. The candidate receiving the most votes for each office is elected to that office."

There is a ballot on the last page of this newsletter if you wish to send it in with your vote. Or you may cast your vote at the Annual meeting on October 4, 2005.

# Hikes

## **Marin Headlands Hike** **Thursday, September 22, 10:30 AM**

On this hike, we'll be exploring a beautiful area just across the Golden Gate Bridge in Marin County. The Marin Headlands were formerly the property of the US Military, but in 1974 the land was turned over to the National Park Service who now administers it. The area is a resource rich in human history and natural beauty. This hike takes us deep into the headlands, where we will discover remnants of the area's military past, breathtaking vistas, and a landscape both wild and accessible. When we scouted out this hike, the area was shrouded in summer fog, but we could imagine the sweeping views from the hilltops overlooking the bay.

The hike follows a loop route of about 5-1/2 miles and is moderately strenuous. There is an 880-foot climb from sea level and some steep, gravel covered downhills, so you will need to wear your hiking shoes. We also recommend a hiking stick to aid you on those downhills. The route has very little shade (not a problem if it's foggy) but we are hoping for a clear day in September so be sure to wear a hat and bring your sunscreen. We plan to eat our lunch at an abandoned radar station dubbed "Hill 88." Along the way we will see the ruins of Army gun batteries that guarded the Bay in the past. As we near the end of the loop, we'll visit the Marin Headlands visitor center to learn more about the area.

For those of you who would like to join us but don't want to do the entire route, there is an alternate 2-1/2 mile loop. We will be leading the longer hike but will provide you with a map and directions as both hikes start and end at the same place.

For an optional activity after the hike, we will drive a short distance to the only restored Nike Missile site in the USA. There we can take a guided tour led by a knowledgeable park ranger who will give fascinating insights into the history of this once vital defense facility. The tour takes about 30 minutes.

Now...directions! It took us about 1-1/2 hours to get there from Santa Clara. Drive north on Highway 280 to the 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue/Park Presidio exit just beyond Daly City. Continue on California Highway 1 North – over Junipero Serra Boulevard, 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue, and Park Presidio – to the Golden Gate Bridge. Immediately after crossing the bridge, take the Alexander Avenue exit. Turn left at the first stop, go under the freeway and then turn right onto Conzelman Road, following the signs for the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and Marin Headlands. After climbing steeply into the headlands for a bit over a mile – the views are spectacular – turn right onto McCullough Road and head

downhill, away from the ocean. Turn left onto Bunker Road, drive past Field Road, bearing left at Mitchell Road. Continue past Rodeo Lagoon and the buildings of Fort Cronkhite. Drive to the end of the road and park in the parking lot. There are restrooms nearby.

Due to the distance we do recommend carpooling. If you need a ride or have room to take others with you contact Lee Westfall at 225-7667. Lee has graciously offered to coordinate carpools for this particular trip.

We hope to see you in September. Bring your lunch and plenty of water.

## **Point Lobos State Reserve Hike** **Friday, October 21, 10:00 AM**

In October we will be visiting a unique environment where the Monterey cypress makes a last stand. The grove at the Reserve is one of only two native stands of these weather-beaten trees in existence.

Point Lobos is a breathtaking meeting of land and sea at the southernmost end of the Monterey Peninsula. The many birds and marine mammals that live in the preserve provide a noisy backdrop to the natural beauty of the area. There are several miles of trails in the Reserve. If we take time to explore all of them, we may be there for quite awhile as there is so much to see. Plan on a leisurely pace – we don't want to miss the harbor seals, sea lions, cormorants, and the wonderful sea otters. The total distance we hike will depend on the wishes of the group. We could go anywhere from two to six miles, but the trails are not difficult. You'll definitely want to bring your binoculars for this hike. A word of warning - poison oak abounds at Point Lobos, so if you are sensitive to it we recommend long pants and long sleeve shirts.

Point Lobos is located three miles south of Carmel just off Highway 1. There is a state park day use fee per vehicle (\$9 including a map). We will meet at 10AM at the Information Station parking lot. From the Reserve main gate, drive until you see a small kiosk with restrooms nearby. There should be adequate parking, but if the lot is full there is additional parking at the Piney Woods picnic area, a short distance from the meeting area. Don't forget lunch and water.

Carpoolers should meet at the Camden park and ride (Camden and Highway 85) at 8:15 AM. See you there!
